



Pot Luck was born in a friendly, welcoming (and slightly sticky floored) room above The Jolly Sailor pub in Canterbury. That was back in June 2011. Since then, Pot Luck has presented a total of eleven events. Big, small, bonkers, fun, dark, comic, experimental, entertaining, challenging – each one has served up a wide variety of performances from a range of artists and companies.

A lot has happened over the three years Pot Luck has been running, and it feels like the cultural landscape in Kent has shifted. We believe Pot Luck has been a part of that shift. As things are continuing to change and develop, Pot Luck's role is shifting too...

Where once contemporary theatre, performance and live art was rare in East Kent, now we frequently see nationally acclaimed cutting-edge work. Where once there were few opportunities for peer networking and exchange, now events which bring artists together pop-up regularly. Pot Luck was conceived as an imaginative, dynamic and innovative response to the needs of Kent-based artists for challenge and stimulation. There may be a stronger performance infrastructure in East Kent but there is still a need for an independent, left field voice of provocation and challenge - Pot Luck will continue to fit that bill! So although the current format Pot Luck is drawing to a close, watch out as it evolves and offers more surprising interventions for artists and audiences...

So, this seemed like a great opportunity to make a little something to look back over the last three years!




